NATURAL HISTORY.

THE BEAR*.

THERE is no animal fo generally known as the bear, concerning which the writers of natural hittory have differed fo much. Their uncertainties, and even contradictions, with regard to the nature and manners of this animal, feem to have proceeded from their not diffinguishing properly the different process; and, of courie, they formetimes aferibe to one the properties of another. In the first place, the land-bear must be diffinguished from the fea-bear, the latter being commonly called the subtle dear, or
