
## Fellow Students . . .


Texas Technological College is a coeducational state-supported institution of higher learning which was founded in 1925. Texas Tech celebrated its Fortieth (Ruby) Anniversary in October of 1965. Located in Lubbock, Texas, on a sprawling 1,844 acre campus that gives it the distinction of being the second largest single tract campus in the United States, Texas Tech has an enrollment of over 18,000 students. In association with the College, Texas Tech also operates a 5,821 acre research farm at Amarillo, Texas.

Texas Tech offers degrees in seven schools—Agriculture, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Engineering, Home Economics, Law, and Graduate. The curriculum includes 84 areas of study leading to a bachelor's degree, 44 areas leading to a master's degree, and 14 leading to a doctorate.

Lubbock, a fast growing city of 160,000, lies in the heart of the South Plains. It contains excellent banking and business facilities, and boasts a modern medical center. Opportunities are available for many cultural activities. Lubbock is known as the city of churches and is consistently recognized as one of the cleanest cities in America.

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# The Red Raider

Until the Fall semester of 1966, all Texas Tech athletic teams were formally named The Matadors, but at that time the Student Senate of Tech passed a bill which officially changed the name to The Red Raiders. Tech teams had been widely known by this name for many years, but it was actually only a nickname until the Senate bill. During the 1930's Collier Parris, then sports editor of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, was inspired by Texas Tech's coast-to-coast schedule and all-red uniforms to dub the team The Red Raiders. Coach Pete Cawthon liked the new nickname and the Tech teams carried it as such until late 1966.

Texas Tech's Red Raider made his first spirit-rousing ride around the football field in 1954 at the Tech-Auburn game in the Gator Bowl. Some maintain that the idea actually dates back to the early years of Texas Tech, when a similar rider mouted a white horse for Tech games. Now The Red Raider traditionally rides a black horse. The original Red Raider was Joe Kirk Fulton, who rode at games from 1953 to 1955. His father donated the first set-up, including the saddle and horse trailer.

Today, The Red Raider has come to occupy a warm spot in the hearts of all Texas Techsans. Bearing the school colors of scarlet and black, he exemplifies the high spirit carried by all Tech teams.

# **Student Government**

## Student Senate

The Student Senate at Texas Tech is composed of 49 members, who are elected proportionately from the six schools: 4 from Agriculture, 23 from Arts and Sciences, 11 from Business Administration, 7 from Engineering, 3 from Home Economics, and 1 from Graduate. The Senate is headed by a president, vice president, secretary-treasurer, and business manager. These executives are elected in the spring of each year, as are the student senators. Presidential and vice presidential candidates must have a 2.0 over-all grade-point average and a 2.0 grade-point average for the semester preceding their candidacy to be elegible for office. In addition, they must have a total of 90 semester hours before taking office as well as a 2.0 grade-point average for the semester just prior to their installation. Candidates for the offices of secretary-treasurer and business manager must meet the same grade point requirements as those running for the two higher offices, but they are required to have only 64 semester hours before taking office. All eligible students are urged to take an active part in their student government in order to acquaint themselves with the workings of a democratic body and to help provide the leadership needed in a system such as we have at Texas Tech.

## Supreme Court

Tech's student Supreme Court is the judicial branch of student government on our campus. Its seven justices, including a chief justice appointed by the president of the Student Senate with approval of the Senate, are selected on the basis of written applications submitted by those asking appointment to the court. The court hands down decisions on questions concerning various aspects of student life at Texas Tech.

#### Freshman Council

Because the incoming freshman class at Texas Tech is not actively represented in the Student Senate, these new members of the campus community elect their own council of representatives at the beginning of the fall term. This is the beginning of student government at Texas Tech, and it is a source of future campus leaders. All interested freshmen should apply as soon as possible after notice of upcoming elections is posted.

#### Men's Residence Council

The Men's Residence Council was organized for the purpose of fostering cooperation among the individual halls and of giving consideration to all problems of mutual concern to the men's halls at Texas Tech. The membership of MRC is composed of two representatives from each hall and three officers elected the preceding year. Since individual hall elections are held each spring, both MRC representatives are usually upper-classmen. However, if a vacancy occurs during the course of the aca-

demic term, it is up to the particular hall council to call an election to fill the vacancy.

Each hall's representatives carry the obligation and responsibility to protect the rights of the men in their hall, to represent the opinion of this segment of Tech's student body, and to serve as a means of communication between the officers of the college and the men in the halls. They attend all meetings of the hall council as well as sessions of MRC to accomplish this end.

At the beginning of each year Men's Residence Council collects a hall assessment from each dormitory. These assessments provide MRC's annual budget which may be used in the sponsoring of activities or projects.

#### Residence Hall Government

Each hall is governed by a hall council, which consists of a president, vice president, secretary-treasurer, MRC representatives, food service representative, and other members elected at the beginning of the year. The hall council sponsors and coordinates the various activities of the hall, and all matters related to the hall government should be taken up with the hall government. Elections are held each spring, and any hall resident who meets the college eligibility requirements is eligible to hold office on the council. These requirements include a 2.0 grade point average for the preceding semester and a 2.0 over-all grade point average.

All men residing in a residence hall are members of that Residence Hall Association.

All Residence Hall Association activities or projects are financed with hall dues. The dues are four dollars per year for each member, and are paid at the beginning of the year. Profits from the hall laundry and dry cleaning concessions are also divided with the Hall Association.

# Men's Residence Halls

## **Bledsoe Hall**

Standing on the east side of the campus and facing College Avenue is the formidable structure known as Bledsoe Hall, the residence of the "Association of Bledsoe Men." Bledsoe Hall and Bledsoe men are a combination that incompass both the history and glory of Texas Tech. Bledsoe men take pride in their every endeavor: be it homecoming decorations, athletic competition, or academic strivings, Bledsoe either is occupying or is approaching the top-most rung. Proof of this is the trophy case in the lobby of the hall containing awards for every phase of Intramurals, including the trophy marking Bledsoe as the 1965-66 Intramural basketball champion.

To be a Bledsoe man is to inherit the traditions of excellence and respectability that have become synonymous with the name Bledsoe Hall. We acknowledge that more modern and convenient residence halls will be built on this campus but we stand firm in our belief that Bledsoe Hall will always surpass them.

## Carpenter Hall

Located on the midwestern part of the Texas Tech campus, lies the up-to-date Carpenter Hall. Because of its situation, Carpenter Hall is one of the most conveniently located men's dorms on campus.

Carpenter has continued in recent years to keep its prestige high among the dorms and its spirit high among the residents because of both social and athletic activities. In the realm of athletics, Carpenter won the All-College Football "B" Team Championship. Carpenter Hall always brings its residents much pride at the "Little 500" Bicycle Race, as well as in the participation in other Intramural programs. Socially, the dorm sponsors many fall mixers, the annual Mistletoe Mixer, the only caroling of girls dorms on campus, a Christmas party for underprivileged children, and the best decorated dorm on campus at homecoming. Coordinating these activities and promoting dorm spirit was the Carpenter Hall House Council consisting of President Larry Howard, Vice President Robert Dunn, Secretary Bill Seyle, Treasurer Dick Rooney, and MRC representatives Walter Tomsu and Allen McClure.

Academically, Carpenter Hall has many high individual grade-point averages, and the dorm has one of the highest grade points on campus. Even with the academic pressure of college life, the social activities of Carpenter Hall make for many gay times.

With the wisdom and experience of its upperclassmen and the fresh new spirit of its new underclassmen, Gaston Hall is destined to become one of the leading residence halls on the Texas Tech campus.

#### Gordon Hall

Gordon Hall, located in the central-eastern sector of the Tech campus, offers its residents an unsurpassed environment in which they can gain social experience and physical development as well as academic growth. Gordon has long held a reputation for its scholastic excellence and high standards of living and continues to build this reputation to even greater heights each year through the 360 men living there.

For eight consecutive years, Gordon has won and held the academic trophy for the highest over-all grade-point average among the men's dormitories, thus maintaining one of the longest-lived traditions in Tech's residence halls. However, this fact does not imply that Gordon men spend all of their time studying. An impressive number of social, spirit, and service projects mark the year's calendar for these occupants.

During the 1966-1967 school year alone, Gordon residents participated in several mixers with women's dorms, organized a dorm picnic and dance, and held open houses during which girl friends and parents were allowed to visit in the dorm. A homecoming "funeral march" sponsored by Gordon Hall and an active participation in the Intramural program displayed the interest Gordon men hold for school spirit and the Tech sports programs. Service projects included sending Christmas cards to Vietnam and collecting coat hangers for a Boy Scout troop. These events and projects emphasize the part that extracurricular activities play in the Gordon man's schedule.

In short, Gordon Hall offers an ideal setting for any Techsan—an excellent academic atmosphere, a well-developed social, spirit, and service program, and a distinctive history as a leading Tech residence hall.

## Murdough Hall

Located on the western edge of the main campus, Murdough Hall is the "home away from home" for 527 Tech men. Excluding men's residence halls that will be included in the new Wiggins complex, Murdough is the largest and only air-conditioned men's dormitory on campus. Another exclusive is Murdough's being the only men's dorm with immediate access to a snack bar housed within the dorm complex. This pioneering venture was greeted enthusiastically by Murdough residents and was a tremendous success.

In addition to the obvious physical attributes of Murdough Hall, there is a tremendous amount of intangible cohesiveness and spirit among the residents themselves. This can be witnessed by a few of the preceding year's hall activities. Murdough made a small contribution to the Vietnam effort by sending Christmas and Easter cards to soldiers stationed there. In addition, Murdough raised supplies and implements for South Vietnamese citizens by aiding "Project Vietnam" on the Tech campus. The lighting of the Will Rogers statue adjacent to Memorial Circle is another contribution of Murdough Hall. Tech athletic events and the intramural program gain increasingly active support from Murdough residents both individually and collectively.

While Murdough Hall is constantly striving for achievement in campus activities and other projects, the main emphasis in the hall is on academic achievement. As such, an atmosphere conducive to study is consistently maintained.

#### Sneed Hall

Sneed Hall, located on the main entrance to the Tech campus, is the first residence hall campus visitors come in contact with. Sneed has long had a reputation for being a friendly residence hall, and residents pride themselves in making visitors and new residents feel welcome.

Many Sneed residents are active in campus activities and carry out many cooperative programs aimed at improving the residence hall and Texas Tech. One of the more popular projects in recent years has been the annual Orphans Christmas Party. Needy children from the Orphanage are brought to the residence and treated to a visit from Santa Claus. These youngsters leave starry eyed, awed by the things these strangers have done for them, and the hall residents leave for the Christmas holidays taking the true meaning of Christmas home with them.

Sneed Hall now houses the Athletic Cafeteria and the residents have many opportunities to mix with the Tech varsity players. Possibly because of this, school spirit in the residence is better than in any other hall on campus. Residents often decorate the cafeteria in an effort to encourage a Tech team to a victory. Sneed Hall always has a good representation at Tech pep rallies.

Sneed offers her residents a well-rounded program of academic, social, student government, and athletic activities. If you are a future resident she looks forward to welcoming and serving you.

## Thompson Hall

Thompson Hall, located across the street from the Municipal Coliseum, is one of the newer and best men's residence halls on the campus. At Thompson we strive to promote individuality, but at the same time encourage fellowship, unity and participation in dorm activities, intramurals, and extracurricular activities.

In 1966-1967, the dorm was led by the Hall Council and the committees dealing with intramurals, inter-dorm activities and academics. The officers were Larry Pleasants, president; Larry Wesson, vice president; Robert Reeves, treasurer; Mike Brawley, secretary; Willis Rossler and David Van De Van, MRC representatives; David Thompson, athletic director; Larry Christian, academic chairman; and Danny Greenwood, food service representative.

At Thompson we first stress our main reason for attending college—an education. We feel that this step in one's life should be his transition period from adolescence to manhood, and that to achieve a good education one must not only obtain a degree, but he must also learn to work with other people. For this reason, and to encourage residence hall participation, each year Thompson holds inter-wiing competition in football, volleyball, basketball, and softball.

A most important facet in our dorm life is our intramural activities. We encourage participation in all team and individual sports. Our swimming and tug-o-war teams captured the all-college titles, while our football and volleyball teams captured their leagues.

We also stress the importance of a resident's social life during college. Dorm social activities vary from mixers with women's halls to dorm parties and movies. Since Thompson Hall is composed mostly of freshmen, the upperclassmen take a special interest in the first week, or "slime week."

The residents of Thompson Hall are always striving to make Thompson a better place to live—for the individual as well as for the group.

#### Wells Hall

Located on the northwest portion of the Texas Tech campus, Wells Hall is convenient to most academic buildings. It is also within easy walking distance of both Municipal Coliseum and Jones Stadium. Completed in 1957, Wells Hall welcomes some 352 men each semester. In its ten years of existence Wells has been an active participant in all phases of campus activity.

Both freshmen and upperclassmen alike enjoy the many "mixers" and dances sponsored by Wells Hall each year. Social activities are highlighted by the Wells Hall Association Christmas Dance held just before the holidays.

Wells Hall offers the resident a wide variety of Intramural sports in which he may participate. Football, basketball, softball, track, golf, handball, and tennis are just some of the many sports open to resident participation. Resident basketball and football tournaments are held each year with each wing of the hall competing. Each fall the football season is ushered in with a freshman-upperclassman football game. Wells also has one of the few weight-rooms facilities on campus.

Despite its active participation in the social and athletic side of college life, the men of Wells never lose sight of the academic aspect of their education. Wells takes pride in ranking high in scholarship. The Wells Hall Association works together to provide its members with a pleasant living atmosphere.

# Residence Hall Activities

Each men's residence hall governing group at Texas Tech seeks to provide a broad program of activities that is suitable for the tastes of each hall resident. With this goal in mind, each hall has embarked upon a program of scholastic, social, athletic, and cultural activities designed to supplement the education of each resident and to enhance the college life of Texas Tech. Hopefully, each resident may choose whatever activities suit his individual personality from those provided by his hall. Much planning goes into the various functions of each hall, and each man should take advantage of the opportunities provided him. Any suggestions for new hall activities should be made through the hall council.

#### Social

One of the goals of the men's residence halls is a well-rounded social program. Social functions such as "mixers" with the women's residence halls, hall dances, parties, and movies are organized to give the residents an opportunity to associate in organized activities apart from the daily hall life and meet new people associated with other aspects of college life. Each resident is urged to round out his social life by attending these varied functions.

Also included in the social activities of some Texas Tech residence halls are certain worthwhile projects. All halls contribute to the annual Vietnam Christmas Card drive, and individual halls hold Christmas parties for orphans in the city.

#### Academic

Scholarship is the fundamental purpose of a college and the residence halls do not neglect this facet of activities. There are several different approaches to scholarship assistance in the halls. Some have an organized tutoring system while others have lists which the residents may consult to receive help in any field of study. From all these scholastic approaches the men's residence halls maintained a grade-point average above 2.00 in 1966-67.

A new effort to aid the incoming freshman student in becoming acquainted with Texas Tech was begun in the fall semester of 1966. During the first few weeks of that term, each residence hall held its own freshman "orientation." The new residents were exposed to hall policy as well as college policy to ensure their knowledge of all necessary rules, services, and facilities of Texas Tech and its residence hall system. This freshman "orientation" will be continued in the future in order to provide new students at Tech more information and help in their first days here.

Increasing need and demand for better study facilities in the dormitories at Texas Tech has resulted in various new plans for the halls of the future and improvements in the present halls. In Weymouth Hall and the two newer halls to be added in the Wiggins Complex next year, typing rooms are provided on each floor. Also, ironing rooms are on each floor for those who wish to avoid disturbing their roommates. New and better accommodations for study will be provided in the future at Texas Tech.

Men's Residence Council at Texas Tech seeks to encourage each hall on campus to work toward higher academic achievement by awarding a scholarship trophy each semester. Gordon Hall has held this trophy for the last eight semesters. Each residence hall is urged to strive toward the highest academic goals possible in order to increase its own stature and that of Texas Tech.

#### Athletic

Almost all well-known sports activities are available to a hall resident on the Texas Tech campus. Both team sports and competition designed for individual participation are included on the list of intramural and intra-hall sports. The athletic programs offered at Texas Tech are designed to offer fun and an opportunity to stay physically fit while striving to win

Each hall on campus enters one or more teams in a wide variety of intramural events. In the fall of each year, a trophy is awarded to the champion football team in the dormitory division, which goes on to compete for the all-college championship. Other team sports such as softball, basketball, volleyball, and hockey follow later in the school term. Of course, the individual sports of tennis, paddle ball, handball, ping-pong, and others are available for those desiring to represent their respective halls in competition on their own. At the end of the year a large trophy is awarded to the organization having the best record in intramural activities.

Each hall also provides athletic equipment for practice and general recreation, and this may be checked out at the hall office. In addition, some halls have football and basketball contests between the various wings in the dormitory. These facilities are provided for the enjoyment of the residents and should be used as fully as possible.

# Facilities and Services

### Room Facilities

All rooms in Gordon, Bledsoe, and Sneed halls have movable furniture that includes two single beds with mattresses, a double desk, a chest of drawers, and two straight chairs. Each room contains two spacious closets.

Rooms in Wells, Carpenter, Gaston, Thompson, Murdough, and Weymouth halls contain modern, built-in furniture that includes individual desks, bookshelves, single beds with mattresses that serve as couches during the day, chests of drawers, and closets. There are individual pegboards and storage space below the beds and above the closets. The rooms in Murdough and Weymouth halls are air conditioned.

Each residence hall room has a lavatory and medicine cabinet. Shower and toilet facilities are centrally located on each wing. Several rooms with private baths are available at extra cost in Bledsoe and Gordon halls. There are no single rooms available in the residence halls. If the halls are not filled to capacity, then some rooms may be occupied by only one resident.

A resident must furnish his own linen and blankets for a single bed, pillow, towels, lamps, broom, and mop. Television sets, air conditioners, and refrigerators are not permitted in the residence halls.

#### Food Service

The Director of Food Service at Texas Tech is responsible for the preparation of four million meals a year for over 9,000 students. The meals are planned in a central office and prepared in a modern kitchen located in each hall. Tech has its own dairy and bakery which furnishes products to Food Service. Also located on campus are large warehouse facilities to enable the College to buy its food stuffs in large quantities.

The price of meals is included in the monthly room rate. In the establishment of room and board rates, it is considered that each resident will miss some meals for various reasons. For this reason, each resident is issued a *nontransferable* meal ticket every month. This policy is in effect to prevent multiplication of food costs. If individual conflicts in the meal schedule arise due to class or work hours, the students concerned should contact their supervisor.

Since the class schedule for 1967-68 includes classes beginning at 7:30 a.m., continuing on the half hour throughout the day, the meal schedule has been revised to allow for these new class periods. The new times will be posted in the dormitories at the beginning of the term.

A Continental Breakfast is also served each morning, Monday through Saturday, after the regular breakfast for those who do not have an early class and who do not desire to eat at the earlier hour.

Each hall has a Food Service Representative to whom questions, problems, and suggestions concerning the meals and dining policies should be taken.

# Telephone Service

A major example of the new progressive look that Texas Tech is beginning to display is the installation of a new Centrex direct-line tele-

phone service. This new system is to be ready for use by the opening of the fall semester, 1967.

In the past there have been times when it was almost impossible to make a call because there were not enough lines available. The new phone system makes it possible to dial direct to any phone on campus without having to go through the campus switchboard. This has eliminated waiting for lines to clear in order to make calls.

In essence the Centrex system is another exchange similar to the POrter, SWift, and SHerwood exchanges which comprise the rest of the city of Lubbock. Three digits were added to the existing four-digit system, to keep in the national trend of changing all phone systems to number prefixes.

Tech students now enjoy complete privacy on their calls under the Centrex system, plus 24-hour phone service. The installation of the Centrex system was a result of an increasing demand for phone service on the Tech campus. Previously there were 4,414 phones on campus. Centrex provides 6,000 phones at the beginning of the fall semester and can expand to 10,000.

Additional equipment can be added to meet the needs of the expected 1975 enrollment of 35,000 students without additional cost to the college, according to the Southwestern Bell Telephone officials, who are installing the system—the first such installation among Southwest Conference schools.

#### Mail Service

U.S. Mail is delivered to and picked up from each residence hall daily, except Sundays and holidays. Two residents are normally assigned to a mail box; the box number corresponding with your room number.

In order that you may receive prompt delivery of mail, it is necessary that your mail be properly addressed. Your address will be:

# Laundry and Dry Cleaning Service

In each hall, laundry and dry cleaning facilities are provided for the convenience of the residents. Two students, Concession Men, operate the laundry outlet. One of these men goes around to each wing of the hall picking up whatever items the residents have to send out for cleaning, while the other remains at the concession to allow residents to pick up their cleaning.

After it is picked up in the dormitory, the clothing is sent out, processed, and returned to the residents as soon as possible. One day service is available for those requesting rush orders. Profits from the laundry and dry cleaning service are shared with the Hall Association.

### Health Service

Texas Tech provides a 32-bed Student Health Center for benefit of those students who become ill but do not require surgery or the treatment of a specialist. Seven days of free medical care are provided per semester for each regularly enrolled student, and a minimum fee for food and drugs is charged for each day thereafter. Students who become ill should contact their Wing Advisor or Hall Supervisor and make arrangements with the Infirmary in order to be treated.

#### Recreational Facilities

Recreational areas are provided in each of the men's residence halls where there is room for ping-pong, card playing, and other forms of relaxation. Each hall also has a colored television set which is located in the lounge area. Some halls have new theater chairs provided for watching television.

# **Vending Machines**

Vending machines for various types of food, candy, and drinks are available in the halls for the resident's convenience. In the event you find a broken machine or lose money due to malfunction of a machine, it should be reported to the hall office. All lost money will be refunded there.

## Maintenance and Housekeeping Service

Each hall has a full-time maintenance man employed to take care of the little jobs that arise in a large building. Although hall residents should try to prevent unnecssary damage, any maintenance problems which arise should be reported to the Wing Advisor of the hall office.

Each residence hall also has maids who clean the corridors, stairways, and lounge areas. The ladies work to keep the halls as neat as possible, and your cooperation with them will benefit all residents in the hall. The hall resident is expected to clean his own room.

## Storage Facilities

Storage facilities are available in each hall in order that residents may store trunks or other bulky items. All items stored must be either in sealed boxes or in closed trunks with the owner's name and home address tagged to the item.

There will be no storage space available in a hall for personal clothing or equipment while the hall is not in operation. Any item left in the hall may be turned over to a charitable institution.

# **Policies and Procedures**

## Responsibility of Residents

The men's residence hall system at Texas Tech believes that the responsibility for knowing how to act remains within the individual, and as a result, the halls do not have a long list of rules to be adhered to. Each man is responsible for his conduct and is expected to be reasonable in his dealings with fellow residents. There are a few acts, however, which we feel are detrimental to good residence hall life and to the success of your college career. These are prohibited.

#### Residents Standards Board

During the 1966-67 school year the Men's Residence Council established and organized the Residents Standards Board. It was set up with the belief that men in the residence halls can and should share in the making and administration of their own way of life within the halls.

The purpose of the Residents Standards Board is to hear student violations. Any member of the hall is privileged to file a report on a violation. The only stipulation is that he must submit the proper forms to the Chairman of the Board within forty-eight (48) hours of the violation.

The board is comprised of five members of the residence hall. A case is presented to the board and they discuss the case privately and arrive at a decision as to what action, if any, is to be taken. The board may penalize a person with anything from hall probation to referral to the Office of the Dean of Men. Any person failing to comply to the board's decision is held in contempt of the board and his case is referred to the Dean of Men.

Any person found guilty of a violation has the right to appeal the

decision of the board to the Dean of Men.

Since the Residents Standards Board exists as a fundamental part of our belief in democratic self-government, the Men's Residence Council will keep working to see that it remains as a part of the privileges and responsibilities of Tech men.

# Quiet Hours

Every effort is made to make the men's residence halls more receptive to good study habits so that each man can better work toward his ultimate goal of a college degree. For this reason, it is requested that each resident observe quiet hours daily from 7 p.m. to 9 a.m. Musical instruments may be played daily between the hours of 5 and 6:30 p.m. Certainly no one will doubt the necessity for study during final examinations week, so it is requested that quiet hours be observed 24 hours a day during that week.

# Room Changes and Hall Transfers

Room changes are permitted once each semester at a time announced by the Hall Supervisor. The supervisor should be notified in advance of the proposed change so that he may consider it. No change will be made except at the announced time. Because of record-keeping complications, no transfers are allowed between halls except prior to the opening of the halls in the fall semester. This policy must be followed to facilitate an accurate records systems and to make it possible to locate students in case of an emergency.

## Open House

Except for the day the hall opens and on days when open house is held, women visitors are not allowed in individual rooms. Open houses are held in conjunction with exchange dinners with the women's halls or other special events placed on the School Calendar in the Dean of Women's Office. At least half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) of the paid staff (Wing Advisors and Hall Supervisor) of a hall are on duty during an open house. All doors to rooms containing female visitors outside the resident's immediate family must be open. Hours for open houses are set by the individual hall council.

#### **Dress Standards**

Since Texas Tech is an informal college, it does not impose rigid dress standards upon its students. Most Tech men dress casually, wearing slacks and sports shirts to class. It is expected that these standards will prevail for meals in the men's residence halls. Athletic attire will not be permitted in the dining halls, nor will pajamas. Dress-up standards prevail for Sunday dinner with slacks and sport shirt sufficing for those not caring to wear a coat and tie. All residents are expected to use good taste in choosing their attire.

## Soliciting


Soliciting or selling in the residence halls is strictly forbidden, and any approach within the hall should be reported immediately to the Hall Supervisor or your Wing Advisor. Students selling newspaper subscriptions are permitted to set up tables in the lobby at the beginning of each semester, but no one else is authorized to sell in the residence halls.

#### **Automobiles**

Authorized parking areas for each hall resident are conveniently located near each men's residence hall. All cars must be properly registered and tagged in order to be allowed to park on the campus. Any car that is parked in an area for which it is not registered will be towed away at the owner's expense.

The entry station system began at Tech in the spring of 1966 as a possible solution to the problem of increased traffic on campus. Concrete-filled barrels served as temporary stations until the fall of 1966, when they were replaced with structural steel stations equipped with two-way radios, telephones, heaters, and even carpeting on the floors. The cost of each unit was in excess of \$2,000.

The entry stations are staffed by Traffic-Security personnel and are in operation from 6:45 a.m. to 5:15 p.m. weekdays and from 6:45 a.m. to 11:15 a.m. Saturdays. The locations of the stations and the rules governing them can be found in the pamphlet "Traffic and Parking Regulations 67-68," prepared by the Traffic-Security Department.

## Women's Halls Regulations

Probably the most popular spot on a college campus for men students is the women's residence halls, and Tech is certainly no exception. It is to every man's advantage, then, that he familiarize himself with the regulations and hours of the women's halls.

Men are permitted to call for their dates in the women's residence halls every morning after 8 a.m., but visiting in the lounges or lobby is permitted only from 12 noon until closing. On Sundays, however, male visitors are permitted in the lounges after 8:00 a.m. Listed below are the closing hours for the women's halls:

All men should set their watches with the time in the women's hall in which he is calling in order to prevent getting the girl back to the hall after the closing time.

The men may be of further help to their female friends by observing the following womens regulation: "the obvious display of affection is extremely bad taste, and it is not permitted in the lounge, lobby, or entrances to the hall."

# Room and Board

Room and board payments are due the first five working days of each month, except at the beginning of the spring semester when the first payment is due the first five working days of the semester. Payments may be made for the full semester or by the month. Penalty payments are added daily to the charge after the five-day period, so every effort should be made to make the payment promptly. Private baths cost an additional \$7.50 per month. If space is available, one student may occupy a double room for \$7.50 extra monthly.

The required \$40.00 room deposit, maintained by each resident, is used as a room deposit to guarantee a nine months residence. In the event a resident breaks a contract, he will forfeit this deposit. At the termination of the school year, this deposit is returned if the resident has not signed a contract for the following year. If a student leaves Texas Tech at the end of the Fall Semester his deposit will be returned provided he applies in writing to Room Reservations by the 10th of January.

# Residence Hall System

## Director of Residence Halls

The Director of Residence Halls at Texas Tech oversees the entire Residence Hall System and is responsible for the budget and all money allocated for running the system. He helps formulate and enforce the rules and regulations in the halls, while receiving reports from the Director of Food Service, the Supervisor of Custodial Service, and Coordinators of both Men's and Women's Residence Halls.

## Coordinator of Men's Residence Halls

In conjunction with hall supervisors, the Coordinator of Men's Residence Halls is responsible for formulating policy and regulations in dormitories at Texas Tech. This administrator is in charge of the orientation of the staff at the beginning of each year, and also serves as an advisor to Men's Residence Council.

## Hall Supervisors

Hall Supervisors, full time staff members of the college with a minimum of a bachelor's degree, oversee the entire hall program. It is a part of their duty to be informed on the activities of all residents within their halls. Duties of hall Supervisors include advising, discipline, hall reports, hall maintenance, record keeping, and establishment of a hall program. Hall Supervisors are responsible to the Coordinator of Men's Residence Halls.

# Wing Advisor

The Wing Advisor has been selected to serve on the hall staff because of the leadership and interest which he has shown in the residence hall. He is an upperclassman or graduate student living in a nearby room and has direct responsibility for keeping order on his wing. The Wing Advisor will be working in the hall office daily, but will be available to assist you at all hours.

# Office Manager

The office manager is responsible for all residence hall mail and assists the hall supervisor in the administrative operation of the hall office. The office manager has the same authority as a Wing Advisor and will assist them in the execution of residence hall policies. The office manager will maintain regular hours in the hall office to be of any needed assistance.



# Important Landmarks and Traditions of Texas Technological College

#### Freshman Beanies

All Freshmen must wear the red and black beanies which were originated in 1962 to replace the old green "slime" caps. They must be worn until the Homecoming bonfire.

#### The Double "T" Bench

The Double "T" Bench, located on the Administration Building Green, was donated by the Senior Class of 1931. Only upperclassmen are allowed to sit on this memorial.

#### **Memorial Circle**

Memorial Circle, located in the center of the campus, was dedicated in 1948 by the Tech War Veterans' Association to all whose service has brought honor to the College and the Country.

## The Victory Bells

The Victory Bells were donated by the Class of 1936. Located in the east tower of the Administration Building, the large bell weighs 900 pounds, and the smaller weighs 300 pounds. They are rung for thirty minutes after every football or basketball victory. Other notable occasions upon which they were rung were when E. J. Holub, David Parks, and Donny Anderson were selected All Americans, and when Tech was accepted into the Southwest Conference on May 12, 1956.
